I have been assaulted- Now what do I do?

In case of an emergency, dial 911.

You are not alone.

Many people survive sexual violence and cope with these experiences.

It can happen to anyone and it is **NOT** your fault.

You do not have to deal with it alone.

We can help.

The resources listed here are victim-centered, meaning the victims can exercise more control over what support and/or treatment they wish to receive.

Are you safe?

If you are not safe, call 911 or DePauw Public Safety at **765.658.5555** for immediate assistance.

If you are in a safe place, call a trusted friend and contact one of the campus or community resources listed here, such as SASA (Sexual Assault Survivor Advocates) at 765.658.4650.

Do you need medical attention?

Immediate medical attention may be necessary to treat injuries, prevent STI's or pregnancy, and collect forensic evidence. All these services are available through DePauw Health at no cost to students. The staff at DePauw Health receives training in caring for students and can administer an exam in a private examination room, day or night.

SASAs are specially trained DePauw staff who can explain the process and help you arrange the exam. Alternatively, you can call 765.658.4800 and request an examination by a "SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) Nurse." Having this exam does not commit you to anything, but it may provide valuable forensic evidence if you choose to pursue criminal prosecution or administrative adjudication. In preparation for the exam, try to avoid bathing, douching, urinating, eating, drinking, or changing your clothes. A SASA or trusted friend can accompany you to the exam. If you do not wish to be treated on campus, a SASA can help connect you to off-campus medical services, including those that offer SANE exams. SASAs also can connect you to advocates; the local Family Support Services can connect you to additional resources.

Do you need to talk to someone?

After a sexual assault, victims often wonder what to do next, including, how to access resources, how to report to campus authorities or how to involve the police. A SASA can help, as can the staff at the Title IX Office, DePauw Counseling Services, and the Women's Center. The Title IX Office can help you with your living arrangements, academic class situations, strategies for completing work and many other interim measures. *You do not need to make an official report to receive these services or interim measures.*

Medical staff, mental health counselors and/or ordained ministers who have received training to provide pastoral care are confidential resources at DePauw. Sexual Assault Survivor Advocates (SASAs) also have limited confidentiality and training to help students who experience sexual violence.

Do you want to report?

Reporting is not required to access university services, but can be beneficial to you and the safety of the community. It is important to talk to someone, even if you do not want to make an official report, file charges, or pursue a full investigation. The Title IX staff can assist with reasonable changes to your housing, class or sports schedule, campus job, or extracurricular activities, regardless of whether or not you choose to make an official report.

Ways to Report

- * **To report anonymously**, visit the Report an Incident of Sexual Misconduct link on the Title IX webpage at <https://tinyurl.com/DPUreport>
- * **Reporting to Public Safety** allows an investigation to be conducted and the information collected during that investigation to be reviewed by both the on-campus sexual misconduct process and the local Prosecutor's Office. You will have the opportunity to discuss your desired involvement in these processes during the review period. Our investigators are fully sworn police, specially trained in sexual assault investigations. Call 765.658.5555, day or night, to speak with a trained officer.
- * **Reporting to the Title IX office**, with staff who are trained in sexual assault investigations and compliance with Title IX is another option. To make a report to the Title IX Office, please call 765.658.4155, 765.658.4914, or email titleixcoordinator@depauw.edu.
- * **Reporting to Local Police** is another option. In Indiana, sexual violence is prohibited under Indiana Code 35-42-4. You can always report sexual assault or other crimes to local police regardless of the University's involvement. DePauw Public Safety cooperates fully with them and the Prosecutor's Office. Call 911 or 765.653.2925 (non-emergency line).

DePauw Sexual Misconduct Process? Indiana Legal Process? Both? Neither?

If you have experienced a sexual assault, these options may feel daunting. Talking to a SASA can help. The Student Handbook (available online) describes the Sexual Misconduct Policy in detail and staff in the Title IX Office can explain that process. The DePauw Title IX team can assist you, as can Public Safety.
