A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR



2016-17 was a milestone academic year for the gallery program. I could go into great detail about the \$60,000 in grant awards for the university art collection, or our stunning 96-page full-color catalog *Abstract Traditions*, or the new Art Educator's Development Day partnership. Rather than delve into the particulars of each of these achievements, I want to use this opportunity to highlight how these terrific accomplishments translated into enormous opportunities for our undergraduate students at DePauw University:

Tiffany Miller '18 completed a summer research fellowship and contributed significantly to the *Abstract Traditions: Japanese Modern*

Prints catalog and exhibition. First-hand experience gained through her work-study position with Christie Anderson helped her earn an internship at the Hirshhorn Museum & Sculpture Garden in Washington, DC.

Amelia Warren '17 enrolled in Museum Research Methods I, an independent study course that examines the social and ethical role of museums in western society. She also conducted research and wrote label copy for the Bruce Walker '53 collection of Tibetan art in preparation for the fall exhibition and print catalog. Ashlyn Cox '18 will continue her research during the summer of 2017 as the incoming summer research fellow.

Ten DePauw students, with majors ranging from Art History to Economics, took part in a Prindle Institute for Ethics topics course this past spring and discussed the book *Provenance: How a Con Man and a Forger Rewrote the History of Modern Art.* First-year student Madeline Smith's final paper was awarded a Prindle Prize for her exceptional work on the ethics of art forgery.

Finally, students enrolled in Alexandra Chamberlain's winter term course spent the month of January getting a crash course in museum studies. Several students from her course now regularly volunteer their time with the gallery staff, while others assisted with Art Educator's Development Day and several K-12 visits throughout the spring semester.

We look forward to our forthcoming accreditation review by the American Alliance of Museums this fall, and hope to see you in the galleries soon.

We've witnessed an incredible amount of positive growth in collections during the past year. The gallery program accessioned 54 new objects into the university art collection this year, and re-housed 500 additional objects including, pottery, masks, and wooden sculptures from Emison to Peeler art storage. More than 300 objects were digitized and added to the PastPerfect museum database.

Thanks to an NEH Preservation Assistance Grant, we were also able to purchase five new flat files for works on paper. Finally, an IMLS grant enabled the purchase of \$25,000 in archival bins for 95% of the painting collection. This has been an exciting year in collections and I'm looking forward to the next academic year!
