A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Following five years of planning, grant writing, and external review, the gallery program at DePauw University has achieved national accreditation—the highest recognition of excellence from the American Alliance of Museums (AAM). The statistics are truly staggering and speak volumes about this tremendous accomplishment:

- 33,000 museums and galleries nationwide
- 1,070 of these programs are accredited by the AAM
- Only 16% of accredited museums (171) are *academic* museums
- And of that percentage, fewer than 50% fall within our staff size and budget

The accreditation process is rigorous. As a result, only three other museums **nationwide** earned first-time accreditation this past spring. Our program was the only college/university museum to do so. The effort requires a significant amount of staff reflection, process improvement, and a commitment to professional practices.

Accreditation translates directly into tangible benefits for our various audiences. Students, for example, will now have the opportunity to intern with an accredited museum program without leaving Greencastle—a benefit that extends beyond the classroom and into future internships, graduate programs, and museum careers. Coupled with the recently approved museum studies minor (fall 2017), DePauw students majoring in a multitude of disciplines—from art history to classics to chemistry—can explore the relevancy of museums and visual culture through their core academic discipline. DePauw is well positioned to train the next generation of museum directors, curators, conservators, and museum educators.

Some of this good work is already emerging even before our museum studies minor takes flight this fall with *Intro to Museum Studies*. Ashlyn Cox '18, for instance, worked closely with gallery staff this past summer to prepare the exhibition and catalog, *Infinite Splendor, Infinite Light: The Bruce Walker 53 Collection of Tibetan Religious Art*. A gorgeous 96 page full-color catalog, along with essays by DePauw University students, faculty, and staff, is a prime example of the unique blend of hands-on experience, education, and research that the gallery program offers.

Finally, students enrolled in Alexandra Chamberlain and Craig Hadley's winter term course spent the month of January digging deeper into the world of fakes, frauds, and forgeries in the museum world. The course culminated in a debate that centered on a controversial art forgery case, along with individual student presentations which explored fakes and museums. Topics ranged from the Fiji mermaid hoax of the 19th century to contemporary forgers like Wolfgang Beltracchi and the art market.

We hope you will stop by the next time you are in central Indiana. 2018-19 will bring equal parts excitement and energy as we hit the ground running with museum studies and a renewed commitment to student-centered learning and engagement.


ABOUT US

During the 2017-18 academic year, the gallery program continued in its growth towards reaching new audiences and expanding its reach across campus disciplines. Not only did we strengthen relationships built in FY17, but in FY18 we expanded our community reach into the Indianapolis Public School system, had a visit from our colleagues at the Purdue University galleries, shared our cup collection at a Libraries team meeting, invited departments across campus administration for tours of our spaces, and partnered with the Greencastle Arts Council for their annual meeting. While this is only a short recount of the over 90 programs held this past year, we are proud to say that throughout our efforts to build a broader audience for our spaces, students were at the core of programming endeavors. Over 1,000 DePauw students and over 400 local K-12 students have visited our spaces this past academic year. We look forward to continued growth across campus and across community in the years ahead.





The collection continued to have positive growth this past year. Along with 35 objects accessioned into the permanent art collection, 15 cups were added to the education collection. Also, the first full inventory of the university art collection, since the addition of the PastPerfect database in 2012, was completed. In PastPerfect, over 3,381 images have been added to the database to date.

Thanks to a National Endowment for the Humanities Preservation Assistance Grant, we were able to purchase bins to house some of our oversized objects including paintings, prints, and drawings. This summer, we will begin to move the art objects and assemble the bins. This academic year, was wonderful and I look forward to the next!




