The class speaker is an ambassador for our 50th reunion class, so nominees should embody professional and civic distinction, service to our alma mater and other meaningful achievements. Nominations will be reviewed by the steering committee to make a final recommendation to the university.

TRANSFORMING DEPAUW'S CAMPUS AND THE GREENCASTLE COMMUNITY

The campus has evolved since our graduation in 1969. During Alumni Reunion Weekend, we will see changes, updates and growth. In hopes of re-introducing you to the place you once called home, here are some key changes that have taken place on campus over the years:

HOOVER HALL

Hoover Hall, the university's 48,600-square-foot dining hall and campus focal point, will serve as the venue for our 50th reunion class dinner on Saturday, June 8. The \$32 million project, which took 29 months to complete, opened Oct. 31, 2016. The lead gift came from Dave and Suzanne Anderson Hoover '67, who were inspired by the lifelong relationships and sense of community that DePauw creates.



LILLY CENTER AND ATHLETICS FACILITIES

Although Bowman Gymnasium was a hub of athletics and student entertainment when the Class of 1969 was on campus, DePauw Athletics has grown over the years.

The Welch Fitness Center opened in August 2014. This 16,000-square-foot, two-story fitness center was made possible by a series of gifts from alumni and friends, including a \$5 million gift from M. Scott '82 and Kimberlee A. Welch, for whom the facility is named. The center is the primary training facility for DePauw's varsity teams and the campus community. It is more than triple the size of the previous fitness center.

Additional updates took place to our athletics campus, inculding Blackstock astroturf and the construction of Reavis Stadium.



ROBERT G. BOTTOMS ALUMNI AND DEVELOPMENT CENTER

DePauw honored its 18th and longest-serving president, Bob Bottoms, by dedicating the new alumni and development center that bears his name. The campus and community were invited to attend the dedication ceremonies and open house for the Robert G. Bottoms Alumni and Development Center, located at 201 E. Seminary St., on last Oct. 12. The president emeritus, who retired in 2008, returned to campus with his family for the event.

"Under the leadership of Bob Bottoms, DePauw – which had been a respected Midwestern institution – became a nationally recognized liberal arts college. He transformed DePauw," D. Mark McCoy, the university's 20th president, said. "Our endowment grew more than five-fold; we attracted world-class faculty; and perhaps most critically, DePauw recognized that its campus needed to reflect the world graduates will live in, and the president made diversity and inclusion a priority. DePauw University became a much stronger entity, thanks to the leadership and vision of Dr. Bottoms. All of his many friends look forward to welcoming him back to this place he loves, and which owes him so much gratitude."





The building, formerly the chapter house of Sigma Nu and later Delta Zeta, now stands as a place of welcome and return for DePauw's alumni.

DOWNTOWN GREENCASTLE

DePauw and the city of Greencastle continue to show grow as a result of the Stellar Community Grant that the partnership received back in 2011. Since then, downtown has gained a new campus bookstore, Starbucks, shops, and unique dining experiences. One of those restaurants, Bridges Craft Pizza and Wine Bar, celebrates their Italian-inspired cuisine with a deep DePauw connection, thanks to owners Judson '74 and Joyce '75 Green.

HOUSING DETAILS FOR ALUMNI REUNION WEEKEND

Many classmates are beginning to ask about lodging during Alumni Reunion weekend, so we wanted to pass along some information about where to stay and what to bring.

The 50th reunion class headquarters and lodging will be in Humbert Hall. If you are planning to stay in there, here is some helpful lodging information.

- Complimentary water, soft drinks, coffee and protein bars will be available in the lobby of Humbert Hall to all members and
 guests of the Class of 1969 through the duration of our stay.
- All rooms have a closet or wardrobe, at least one single bed, a desk, a chair, a dresser and a bookshelf for each guest. Residence hall
 rooms are carpeted and have blinds.
- Linens, pillows and wastebaskets will be provided; however, we encourage you to bring any items that will ensure your stay
 is comfortable (i.e. extra blanket, pillow, sweatshirt, socks, etc.). The dorm rooms can get chilly at night, so be sure to pack
 accordingly.
- Wireless access is available if you wish to bring a smartphone, laptop or tablet device.
- Each floor has separate community bathrooms for men and women.
- This location is on campus, right behind the Green Center for the Performing Arts, which makes for a quick walk to all of the
 reunion events that we will be planning for the weekend and an even quicker shuttle ride (there will be shuttles around campus,
 too!).

Items you should consider bringing:

- Shower caddy and shower shoes.
- Robe or cover-up.
- Towels (towels are provided for each guest, but they are small).
- Hangers.
- Alarm clock.
- Blow dryer
- Small mirror if you prefer to get ready in your room.

Registration opens in March, and you can register to stay in Humbert Hall. Local accommodations information will be available on our webpage, which includes information about AirBnB options and the Holiday Inn Express in Cloverdale. Please note that there are not shuttles from these off-campus locations to and from campus.


